“ When I first started my career on Wall Street, for JJ Kenny I was young, inexperienced, and had no college background to lean on. John took me under his wing from the very beginning. He wasn't just my boss — he became a mentor, a friend, and someone who quietly shaped the direction of my life in ways I didn't fully understand until I matured.

John had a way of guiding you without ever making it feel like a lecture. His advice was calm, steady, and silently powerful. Looking back now, I realize that many of the good decisions I made early in my life were influenced by him. If it hadn't been for his guidance, I truly believe I wouldn't be a homeowner today.

Working on the trading floor with John never felt like a job. He had his rules, of course, but he balanced them with humor, warmth, and a personality that made every day memorable. His sense of humor was his greatest asset. We had code names for people, inside jokes that made no sense to anyone else, and laughs that still make me smile when I think of them.

John prided himself on his perfect attendance. He never called in sick — and if you did, he would jokingly question whether you were really sick at all. It was one of his funny “rules” that everyone came to know and laugh about.

He had this special way of making people feel seen and valued. He paid attention. He listened. He offered thoughtful advice. He was someone you naturally looked up to and admired. I still remember the car he kept covered in his garage because he could never bring himself to let it go — a small detail that somehow captured his personality perfectly.

John left a lasting impression on everyone fortunate enough to know him. I feel deep sadness that his life was cut short, but immense gratitude that I had the privilege to work beside him and learn from him.
